Prior to joining J&J, Dr. Dutta was an Associate Professor of Surgery at Stanford University School of Medicine and an attending surgeon at Lucile Packard Children's Hospital at Stanford. He has nearly two decades of experience as a healthcare provider, and is recognized as a leader in multispecialty minimally invasive surgery. He has extensive experience with advanced laparoscopic, thoracoscopic, and robotic procedures, and has pioneered a number of operations including robotic portoenterostomy, laparoscopic hepatectomy, single incision surgery, and transaxillary endoscopic surgery. Dr. Dutta developed a number of "scarless" procedures that together embody a surgical approach called Stealth Surgery. He co-directed an FDA funded lab (called MISTRAL) in collaboration with the Robotics & Medical Device Division of SRI International, which focused on the development of disruptive medical technologies and has produced a number of patents. He has published extensively in the areas of minimally invasive surgery, robotic surgery, surgical innovation, and surgical education.

Dr. Dutta spent the last several years advising early and late stage investment funds in their healthcare investments including medtech, digital health, biotech, and quantified-self. He has advised a number of large healthcare corporations in product development and risk assessment, and early stage healthcare startups in product development and business strategy.

Dr. Dutta received his MD degree from the University of Calgary in Canada. He trained in Abdominal & Thoracic surgery at Dalhousie

University, followed by fellowship training in Minimally Invasive & Robotic Surgery at McMaster University, and Neonatal & Pediatric Surgery at the Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto. He is a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons, the Royal College of Surgeons of Canada, and the American Academy of Pediatrics. Dr. Dutta also holds a graduate degree in Educational Psychology from the University of Illinois and an MBA from the Stanford Graduate School of Business.
